| 3   | AusDBF Annual Report 2016<br><u>Directors Reports</u><br>Each of the AusDBF Directors were invited to comment on the past year. Comments made<br>or issues raised as follows:<br>Vic Fazakerley (Acting Chair)<br>Vic congratulated the Albury Organising Committee for the 2017 National Championships,<br>noting that, in spite of the unfortunate weather conditions, everything ran smoothly, the<br>competitors/spectators were happy with the arrangements, volunteers were plentiful and the |   |      |   |  |

officials were well in control.

Vic also noted the changes in Board membership and the resulting Board vacancies which, in addition to the resignation of Jo Grant, and the change to the World Championships to two campaigns instead of one, made it difficult for the Board members to be as responsive or efficient as they would have preferred.

He also congratulated Serghei Cucsa, the other coaches, and all the managers, including the General Manager, for the success of the Australian team both in France and China. Vic also referred to the plans for the 2018 National Championships noting the meeting held the previous day between AusDBF and the DBQ Organising Committee to look at the impact of the Commonwealth Games and how to showcase this sport, and also the ramifications of bringing forward the date of the National Championships.

Vic's final comment as the outgoing Acting Chair was a suggestion that the AusDBF Board needs to take on a more strategic role which should also including the resurrection of the Oceania group, noting that Fiji is now expressing interest.

**Rex Tindal** (Development Director)

Rex referred the meeting to his report in the Annual Report, in particular the work undertaken with the Level 1 and 2 Coaches course, noting that 150 have attended the course, with 126 having passed their accreditation.

He also pointed out that AusDBF has been undergoing an accreditation process as a result of the collaboration with ASC. An email from Maggie Boyce describing the work done by Dangerous Minds was read.

Rex reported on the challenges faced by the Auroras with the splitting of the World Championships to two venues. However, as the competition in France provided for 24 countries to compete with the Juniors, they experienced the best racing opportunities possible. The resulting 61 medals awarded to the Australian team were the largest number ever received, a significant achievement.

Rex will continue to work with the Development people in each of the states.

Vic Fazakerley (Technical Director)

Vic thanked the race officials who attended Nationals in Albury Wodonga.

He also reported that 58% of exemption requests were approved.

As nearly 80% of officials in Australia are at Level 1, and, with five courses held this year, 54 more officials were accredited as Level 1. There is a need to upgrade them by having them attend more events.

Vic pointed out the changes made to the Competition Regulations and Rules of Racing, in particular the notation regarding Club Crew World Championship acceptances, and the clarification regarding crews marshalling 2-3 races prior to their race.

Michelle James (Finance Director)

The meeting noted Michelle's report and the emphasis put on the importance of paying Early Bird fees on time. She also raised the method for clubs to allocate race fees across their club.

Angle Aston (Administration Director)

Angie thanked the State members for their patience and support this year particularly with the number of Board vacancies and the loss of continuity with Jo Grant resigning in August. A new Admin/Finance role is being discussed and it is expected that the new Board will make a decision quickly.

Melanie Cantwell (Technical Director)

Melanie reported that her focus had been on preparing an EOI for Race Officials,

Presenters and Officials, and she has also circulated an EOI for 2018 AusChamps officials. Melanie pointed out that since her previous time on the AusDBF Board, a number of things had changed, and, while she had been able to contribute with her experience as a previous AusDBF Board member and as an IDBF member; she had also been on a learning curve. The meeting approved the Annual Report as follows:

The meeting thanked Victor Fazakerley for his time spent on the Board and his contribution to the sport of dragon boating.
